The 2021-2022 school year has been a tremendous success for the Delta Lambda chapter. Pike's achievements continue to set an example for other Greek fraternities at Florida State and across the country.

Our chapter has historically had a large presence in campus leadership. Seminole Student Boosters, the official subsidiary organization of Seminole Boosters, has been heavily influenced by brothers on the executive and governing boards. During the last school year, SSB had fifteen brothers occupying vital positions among its leadership. Student Government had three representatives from our fraternity and held important roles in the budgeting committees. Additionally, Line Dance, a massive Greek wide philanthropy event, had a leadership composed of Delta Lambda brothers. Because of their direction and decision making, Line Dance raised \$216,000 that supports the Collegiate Veterans Association, Unconquered Scholars, and the FSU Student Union. The drive for leadership extends beyond on-campus activities and out into the business world, too. Two brothers have started media companies that service not only Tallahassee, but most major cities in Florida and adjacent southern states. Over five brothers had real estate ventures that found success all while in college. Additionally, one brother has been working in Rick Scott's office here in Tallahassee and also on Capital Hill in Washington DC. These accomplishments are only a few examples of how the members of Pi Kappa Alpha have had a huge appetite for hard work and success during their time at Florida State.

Our chapter has been well known for being a powerhouse of varsity athletes for Florida State and beyond. Jordan Travis, the starting quarterback for Florida State football has joined our ranks. Additionally, Devontay Love-Taylor won the Don Powell Award and now is moving on to play professionally with the NFL. Mat Nelson has been drafted in the first round pick to play for the Cincinnati Reds.

Additionally, the chapter has continued their legendary social tradition by featuring incredible artists for their semester parties. In the fall, Pikes of the Jungle, featured famous DJ and remix artist, James Hype. The entire event space was decorated to include a flowing river, wild vegetation, and a large handmade cave containing a bridge leading to the courtyard. In the spring, two famed parties returned to Heritage Grove. Pikestock, fashioned after the famous 1960s Woodstock, hosted local Tallahassee DJs and brightly dressed students alike. The house was decorated with water slides, a swimming pool and an obstacle course. For the first time in five years, Pikes of the Caribbean has made

a comeback. The brothers banded together to construct a fifty-foot multi-tier pirate ship that was half the length of the courtyard. The party featured famous house artist, Kyle Walker.

On the academic side, Delta Lambda has some of the most extraordinary talent on campus. Our chapter has students studying to become lawyers, politicians, nurses, accountants, real estate agents, finance officers and entrepreneurs. We have ten brothers in FSU's Garnet and Gold Key Leadership Honor Society which is for outstanding contributions in the areas of leadership, service, spirit, and scholastics. Our fraternity boasts an above average GPA of 3.15 and have over fifteen seniors going to grad school.

In other news, Delta Lambda is excited to announce that we have initiated our 3,000th brother into the fraternity! In addition, our Pike chapter ranks number two nationally for the most amount of initiates for 2021 at an impressive: 95 new initiates. In July, Pi Kappa Alpha brought home its 22nd Robert Adger Smythe Award and many others at the International Convention in Louisville, Kentucky.

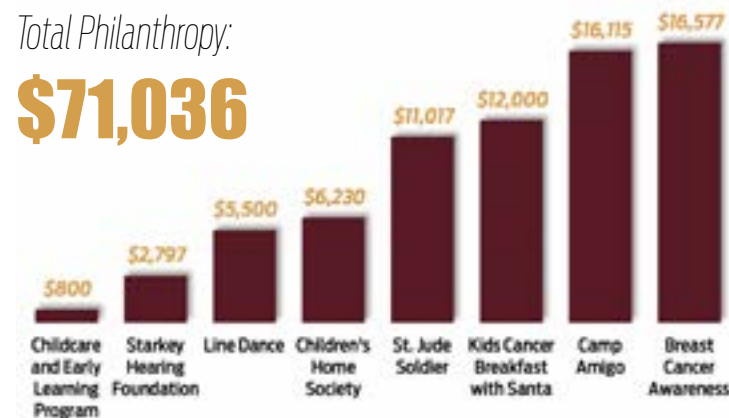

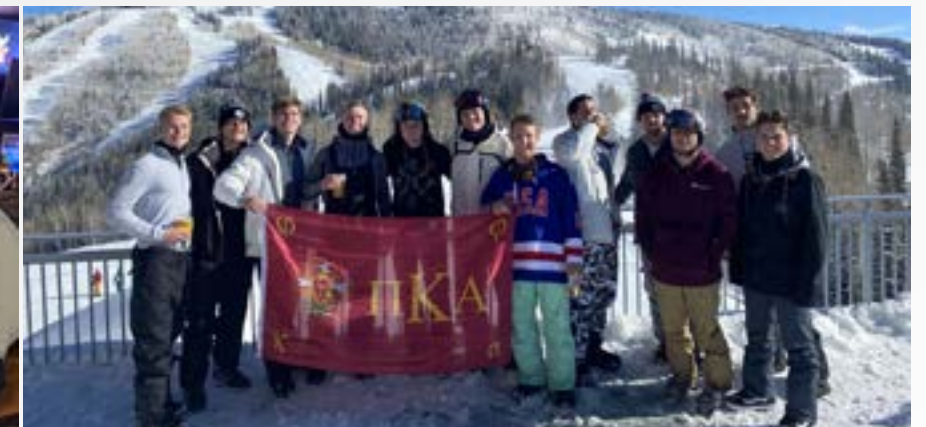

PGA TOUR PRO
DAN BERGER



Golf powerhouse, **Daniel Berger '12**, is a sunshine state native born and raised in South Florida. He was raised by an athletic family that was accomplished in tennis and golf. He began playing golf at age 10 and started taking professional lessons after attending a summer golf camp. Upon realizing that he had a real knack for the sport, Dan decided to become more competitive. At age 12, he entered the US Kids International Championship where he shot rounds of 75, 79, and 75. Soon after, 13-year-old Berger attained his first hole-in-one. Dan expressed to his father that he wanted to become a professional golfer and continued to enter tournaments throughout his teenage years to further refine his skill. Dan graduated from high school never playing for his high school golf team opting to focus more on amateur tournaments. However, upon arriving in Tallahassee in 2011, Berger played for Florida State's golf team and became a brother of Pi Kappa Alpha.

In early 2013, Dan won the SunTrust Gator Invitational and the Seminole Intercollegiate. He went on to lead the ACC with a 69.36 stroke average. Later that same year, he tied for second place at the NCAA Golf Champi-

onships, was named a two-time first-team All-American by the Golf Coaches Association of America and Golfweek, and named to the All-Nicklaus team, All-ACC team, and PING All-Region team. When only 20 years old, Dan Berger turned pro.

Berger went on to qualify for the Web.com Tour and later tied for second place at the TPC Stonebrae Championship. His promotion onto the PGA Tour occurred in 2014 after ranking 15th in the season-long Web.com Tour standings. In 2015, Berger shot admirable scores at the Honda Classic and the Arnold Palmer Invitational where he made a double eagle at the par-5 sixth hole during the third round. In all, Dan Berger made the cut in 17 of 31 events, had six top-10 finishes, including two seconds, and was the only rookie to make the Tour Championship field in late September. He capped off the season by being named PGA Tour Rookie of the Year.

In 2016, Berger achieved a milestone by winning the FedEx St. Jude Classic. This achievement moved him to 29th in the Official World Golf Ranking. His repeat performance in 2017 allowed Dan to successfully defend his title and moved him to 24th in the world. Within a few months, Berger was ranked 20th in the world which earned him a spot on the 2017 US Presidents Cup Team. The following year, Berger shot a third-round 66 at the U.S. Open, putting him in a 4-way tie for the lead with Dustin Johnson, defending champion Brooks Koepka, and Tony Finau. Berger went on to tie for 6th place.

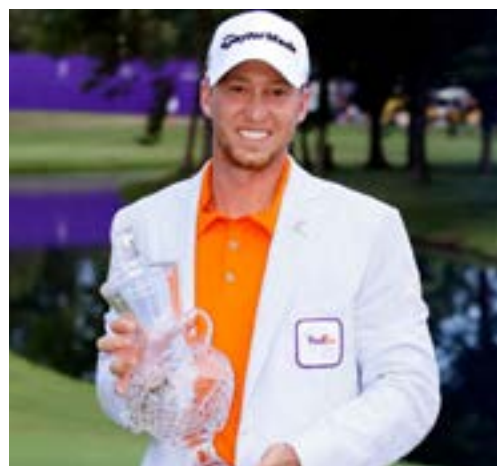
Despite a three-month stasis due to the global pandemic, Berger triumphed at the 2020 Charles Schwab Challenge. With that win came a well-earned paycheck and ranked Dan 31st in the world. He had a streak of 32 consecutive rounds at par or better in 2019–2020, the eighth-longest streak since 1983. Berger also won the 2021 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am shooting a 65 in the final round, eagling the final hole to win by two strokes ahead of Maverick McNealy. Berger represented the USA as one of the team members par-

ticipating in the 2021 Ryder Cup. The U.S. team won 19–9 and Berger went 2–1–0 including a win in his Sunday singles match against Matt Fitzpatrick.

Golf is one of the most intense sports in the world. It requires peak mental and physical ability to be among the best. Berger looks at each tournament he participates in objectively, treating each as a learning experience. He is conscious of where his strengths lie and what areas need attention. Berger claims that the very act of participating in so many competitions allows him to better adapt to the pressures of the crowds and the other golf professionals. Berger states, "Once you do it enough, you get numb to the crowds and forget about them." He emphasized, "Focus and preparation."

For many beginners or amateur golfers, the sport can have quite the learning curve. Berger's best advice for aspiring golfers is to be consistent. "Get a lesson once a week and do not neglect your short game. Make sure to practice it one to two days per week." Another tip Berger gave was, "Make sure to have fun and enjoy it. Realize the skill level you are at now and enjoy it. You will get a lot better just by not thinking about being super competitive and focusing on just making good swings."

Today, Berger continues to prepare for his next tournament; always striving to reach the next milestone on his way into the PGA history books. He intends to keep climbing the world leader board and win majors. Berger continues to practice and live in Jupiter Florida, and in his spare time, plays tennis and fishes off his boat.



PIKE COMPETES
IN BEIJING

Josh Williamson originally dreamed of becoming a lacrosse superstar, became a world-class bobsled athlete, and represented the United States at the 2022 Beijing Winter Olympics. Williamson was originally enrolled at Mercer University to play Lacrosse until he decided to pivot and transfer to Florida State after suffering from injuries.

Williamson was a natural athletic ability and he still wanted to stay active after his recovery. He decided to continue training in the gym and followed people on social media who did high-intensity workouts like his. He

eventually stumbled upon athletes who were on the bobsled team, who routinely enjoyed heavy weightlifting, sprinting, and jumping. It seemed like synchronicity the whole time. Williamson was training for the bobsled team without even knowing it. Williamson contacted the coaching staff of the bobsled team, and the rest is history.

Williamson continued to train with his team and become a powerhouse on the ice. Williamson went on to hold two World Cup bronze medals which led to attention from the US Olympic team. He tried out for the team and successfully became FSU's first Winter Olympics athlete. He proudly represented the United State in Beijing's 4-man bobsled event.

After graduation, Williamson aims to look for a way of maintaining his athletic passions and combine them with his marketing degree. He took an internship with the US Bobsled and Skeleton Federation's marketing director which gave him great insights into the behind-the-scenes marketing efforts. Williamson continues to stay involved in the athletic industry and keeps his sight locked on another Olympic appearance in 2026.



PLAYING FOR THE REDS
MATT NELSON

Mat Nelson entered Florida State University in the summer of 2018. Hailing from Largo, Florida, the Calvary Christian High School graduate became the starting catcher for FSU baseball in 2019 and demonstrated his skills consistently throughout the season. He was instrumental on the team, leading Florida State to the College World Series.

As a quickly evolving freshman, Nelson hit .282 and started all eight games of FSU's impressive postseason run that led to the team's 23rd College World Series appearance. By his sophomore year, Nelson was recognized as the best catcher in the nation, a unanimous

first-team All-American, and ACC Player of the Year. He posted some stellar national stats by leading with 23 home runs and ranked in the top 10 in home runs per game, slugging percentage, and total bases. He was a finalist for the Dick Howser Trophy and a semifinalist for the Golden Spikes Award. Nelson won the Buster Posey & Johnny Bench Award, for the nation's best catcher.

After much interest by Major League teams across the nation, Mat Nelson was drafted No. 35 overall by the Cincinnati Reds after his sophomore season.

Orians Excellence Award and the Scholarship Plate Award. The award ceremony was held at the 2022 International Convention at Louisville, Kentucky.



ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

REAL LIFE TOP GUN JOE FEHELEY

After more than three decades and over 5,000 hours of airtime, **Lt. Col. Joe “Hooter” Feheley** is hanging up his wings. A real-life “Top Gun”, Feheley was the most senior F-16 fighter pilot to retire at the age of 60.

Joe attended Florida State as a first-generation college student from 1980-1984, studying finance. Joe was not a Pike yet, but brothers in the house knew he was a wrestler and asked if he would like to wrestle for Delta Lambda Pikes. Feheley agreed to compete for the fraternity, but the Lambda Chi’s tried to get him kicked out because they said he wasn’t a Pike pledge. However, the Pikes had already paid his intramural pledge fee, so the intramural officials said he was good to go. The first person he wrestled in the tournament was a Lambda Chi, who Joe pinned in 52 seconds. The next semester a bid was extended to Feheley to enter the brotherhood.

After graduation, Feheley moved to Miami and worked as a stockbroker for four years. When he started making some money he decided to take flying lessons. Feheley quickly realized that he had a special skill for flying and the life of a broker wasn’t for him. In 1987 Feheley met Mark Provo ’82 at the Pike house during a Florida State Homecoming game. Provo was halfway through Navy flight training at NAS Chase in Beeville, Texas (Provo went on to have a distinguished Navy career and even fly as a Navy Blue Angel). Provo convinced Feheley to go see recruiters for the Navy and Air Force. Feheley went to see the Air Force recruiter and was told that they weren’t looking for finance majors wanting to become fighter pilots. He also said his 2.5 GPA was too low and that he was 17 days from being too old. Feheley used his stockbroker sales skills to get permission to take the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test (AFOQT). Scoring 99% across the board, Feheley went on to get the necessary recommendations, including a personal letter from then Senator Lawton Chiles. Unfortunately, the first Air Force selection board turned him down, but luckily Feheley made a good enough impression the second time around and was able to meet the flight physical deadline. The following month the Air Force awarded him a spot at Flight Screening Program Officer Training (FSPOT), with follow-on courses to Officer Training School and Pilot training.



A new chapter began and Feheley went through training at Lackland Air Force Base emerging as a Second Lieutenant. Joe went on to Pilot Training in T-37s and T-38s and, upon graduation, he went on to become an A-10 Thunderbolt II pilot (Warthog). His first assignment was to RAF Bentwaters in England where he aided in operation Desert Storm and started a European tour of duty. Joe was selected to cross train to the F-16 Viper which he flew from 1994 until the end of his career in 2021.

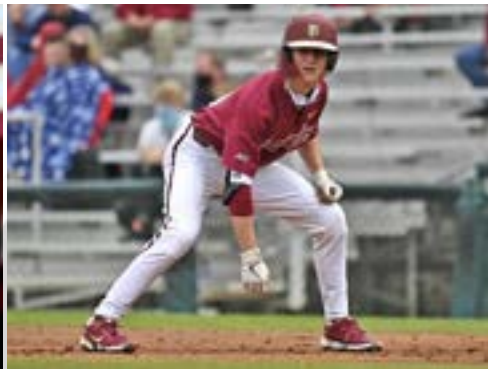
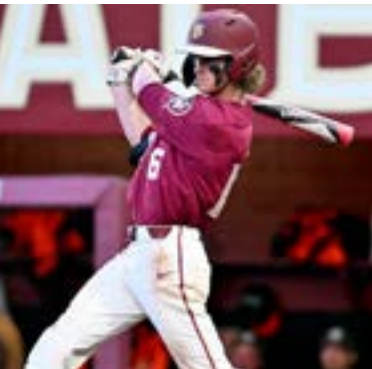
When asked about things that stood out in his career he responded, “A remarkable memory of the last thirty years for me was that for the entire period, I was in an Air Force that was constantly at war.” Feheley took part in every US military campaign from Desert Storm in 1991 to Afghanistan in 2021. Feheley was deployed flying over Turkey, Iraq, Bosnia, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, and Afghanistan. He accumulated over 500 hours of combat time and ended up being the oldest F-16 pilot dropping bombs in combat over Afghanistan. The Air Force gave Feheley a waiver to allow him to continue to fly until the day he turned 60. His last Squadron Commander was quoted as saying, “he was still good in the Jet and humble at the same time.”

Today, Feheley has returned to retire in Tallahassee and remains active in the Delta Lambda Pike chapter. He was the Chapter advisor for two years when he completed the FSU MBA program while achieving a 3.92 GPA to make up for his grades in the 80’s. Feheley wants to be more involved in Pike so he can make up for some of the events he couldn’t participate in back in the 80’s because he was busy working so many hours to pay his way through college. His most recent contribution to the house was organizing the first annual “Back to School” for alumni to relive their time as young brothers in the Pike house while making better bonds with the current undergrads. Feheley continues to be close with the ‘80s alumni and was happy to see his son Sean follow in his footsteps as a Florida State Pike.

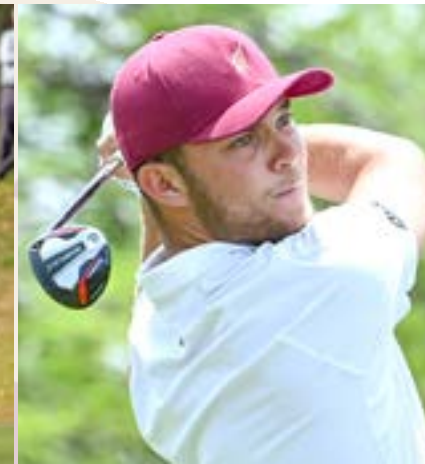
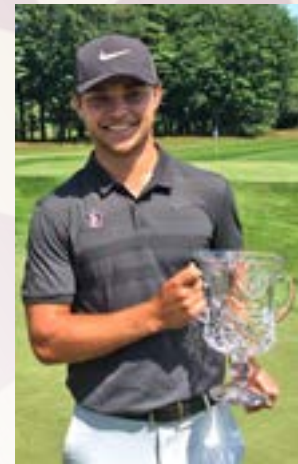
